"until the third day" Matt 27:64 (Matthew uses yet another term for Jesus' time in the tomb)

Luke's Testimony: not "after..." --> "on the third day" Luke 27:7, 21, 46; 1Cor 15:4

Not a literal 72 hours: (loose equivelant) "after three days" & "on the third day" compare the same episodes in different Gospels (cf. Mark 8:31 & Matt 16:21; and cf. Luke 9:22 & Mark 10:34)

Jesus in the grave = 3 "Onah's": "We have a teaching 'A day and a night are an Onah and the portion of an Onah is as the whole of it" c.AD100 -Rabbi Eleazr ben Azariah (Jerusalem Talmud: Shabbath ix 3)

Straightforward chronology: Luke 23:50-24:3 --> Burial Fiday before sundown (Luke 23:54); Sabbath rest Saturday (Luke 23:56); Tomb empty at sunrise Sunday (Luke 24:1)
